82-year-old suspect in 1976 killings arrested in Wisconsin

SILVER CLIFF - Wisconsin authorities have arrested an 82-year-old man suspected of fatally shooting a young couple 43 years ago.

The Marinette County Sheriff's Office on Friday said DNA evidence links Raymond L. Vannieuwenhoven to the shootings of David Schuldes, 25, and Ellen Matheys, 24. They were killed in the town of Silver Cliff in 1976.

Authorities arrested Vannieuwenhoven in the Town of Lakewood in northern Wisconsin. The Sheriff's Office released new sketches of the suspect last summer using DNA from Mathey's clothing.

Body count from mass grave near Arizona border now at 42

TUSCON, Ariz. - The number of bodies recovered from a mass grave in Mexico near the Arizona border has risen to 42 after three days of searching, the Sonora attorney general's office said. A group of Mexican mothers who belong to Madres Buscadoras de Sonora, or Searching Mothers of Sonora, discovered the burials Wednesday near the beach resort town of Puerto Peñasco, commonly known in Arizona as Rocky Point.

Staff members from the attorney general's office, as well as forensic workers from the state's criminal investigations unit, joined the mothers in their search. They will help transport the bodies to a lab and identify the remains.

The women found 13 bodies Wednesday, fully clothed. On Thursday they found an additional 14 bodies, according to state officials. More bodies were uncovered Friday.

The identities of the dead were not known.

Gun supplier wants to withdraw guilty plea

RIVERSIDE, Calif. - The man who bought two rifles that terrorists used to kill 14 people in a 2015 terrorist attack in San Bernardino wants to withdraw his guilty plea.

Through his lawyer, Enrique Marquez told a federal judge Friday that he'll withdraw his 2017 plea to providing material support to terrorists. Attorney John Aquilina says he'll file the motion by May 13. Aquilina won't detail the reason for the decision, which federal prosecutors are expected to challenge. Marquez was facing a potential 25-year prison sentence.

Marquez bought the semi-automatic rifles used by Syed Rizwan Farook and Farook's wife, Tashfeen Malik, in the attack on a Christmas party gathering of San Bernardino County employees. The couple later died in a police firefight.

Prosecutors said Marquez knew Farook but wasn't involved in the attack.

Baseball

The New York Mets have reached an agreement with free-agent Dellin Betances on a one-year contract with a player option for 2021.

The Mets announced the deal with the four-time all-star Friday. Betances is guaranteed \$10.5 million under the contract.

The 31-year-old, who is from New York, is staying in his hometown after spending his first eight seasons in the majors with the Yankees.

He missed most of 2019 because of various injuries. Betances' season ended after just eight pitches. He tore an Achilles tendon in his first appearance back from a lat injury that had sidelined him since spring training.

Betances was the first reliever in baseball history to have 100 or more strikeouts in five consecutive seasons (2014-2018).

1 dead in attack of Ebola treatment center

KINSHASA, Congo - Armed assailants again attacked an Ebola treatment center in the heart of eastern Congo's deadly outbreak on Friday, with one police officer killed and health workers injured.

The early morning attack in Butembo came less than a week after the treatment center reopened following an attack last month, which forced aid group Doctors Without Borders to suspend its operations in the city. Security forces repelled Friday's attackers, one of whom was wounded, Butembo Mayor Sylvain Kanyamanda said.

The latest attack occurred hours before the World Health Organization director-general visited the center, which remains open. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus encouraged health workers to continue their fight against the second-deadliest Ebola outbreak in history, which is spreading in a region compared to a war zone.

"It breaks my heart to think of the health workers injured and police officers who died in today's attack, Tedros said.

Figure Skating

Fifteen-year-old Anna Shcherbakova of Russia won the women's free skate at the Cup of China on Friday to capture her second Grand Prix title of the season.

Shcherbakova, who led after Thursday's short program, underrotated her opening quadruple lutz-triple toeloop combination but landed a quad lutz on her next jump and finished with 152.53 points for a total of 226.04.

Japan's Satoko Miyahara finished second with 211.18 overall points while Russia's Elizaveta Tuktamysheva was third with 209.10 after finishing second in the free program.

World silver medalists Victoria Sinitsina and Nikita Katsalapov of Russia clinched gold in ice dance with 209.90 points. Madison Chock and Evan Bates of the United States were second with 208.55 points.

Royal baby: King Jigme Khesar and Queen Jetsun Pema of Bhutan expecting second child

King Jigme Khesar Namgyel Wangchuck and Queen Jetsun Pema of Bhutan are expecting their second child later this year. The king announced the couple's happy news during a speech on Friday - the 112th National Day of Bhutan, when the country celebrates its culture and pays tribute to the past, present and future kings. Photos from the festivities were posted on the royal's Instagram, with the caption: "112th National Day: His Majesty The King announced that Their Majesties are expecting a second Royal Child." King Jigme Khesar, 39, and his wife, 29, have a son Jigme Namgyel Wangchuck, also known as the Dragon Prince, who was born in February 2016. His name wasn't announced until two months later and prior to that, he was known only as The Gyalsey, which means "prince." When the new royal baby is born, he or she will be second-in-line to the Bhutan throne, however if the child is a girl, she could be displaced by a future younger brother.

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Maj. General chosen as Burundi ruling party candidate

Burundi's ruling party has named its secretary general, Maj. Gen. Evariste Ndayishimiye, as its presidential candidate in elections in May, as President Pierre Nkuruziza steps down after 14 years in power.

Maj. Gen. Ndayishimiye is seen as moderate, and is generally respected by the opposition and public, despite his long-standing relationship with Mr Nkurunziza.

He was not implicated in atrocities committed during the crisis which broke out in 2015 after Mr. Nkurunziza decided to run for a controversial third term.

Maj. Gen. Ndayishimiye has been the secretary-general of the ruling CNDD-FDD party since 2016, making him the favorite to succeed Mr. Nkurunziza.

He survived the massacres on university students in June 1995 during the civil war that erupted after the assassination of President Melchior Ndadaye in 1993.

Maj. Gen. Ndayishimiye joined what was then the CNDD rebel group, and fought alongside Mr. Nkurunziza.

When the CNDD-FDD went into government following the Arusha peace accord in 2003, he had already climbed to the rank of Maj. Gen. in the rebel group and was transferred to work in the national army's high command.

After the disputed 2005 election, Maj. Gen. Ndayishimiye became minister of interior until 2007 when he was appointed as Mr. Nkurunziza's military adviser.

Suspects held in beating death

Wausau Police say a botched burglary attempt might have caused the beating death of a 49 year old man with a baseball bat. Kerby Kniess was found dead at his home around 7:15 yesterday morning. Two men are in the Marathon County Jail today awaiting charges. Police said this morning that a 20 year old man was arrested early in its investigation and an 18 year old suspect turned himself in late last night. Both were booked on felony murder and armed burglary charges. Kniess, a long-time figure in Wausau's bowling community, was staying in a detached garage at the home. Those living in the house found Kniess dead and called 911. An autopsy showed that he died from head trauma and a skull fracture.

Five Alarm blaze near downtown Milwaukee at the Food Castle grocery

About 10 dozen fire fighters were battling a five alarm blaze near downtown Milwaukee early this morning. Units were called around six o'clock to a building that housed the Food Castle grocery store at 12th Place and Vliet Street. One fire fighter was injured. The extent was not immediately known. A butcher at the store told WTMJ TV that he and other co-workers were turning on the lights when something generated sparks. Another employee was taking out garbage when he saw smoke on one side of the structure. By 8:15, part of the building's south side had collapsed. Smoke from the blaze billowed onto the nearby Marquette freeway interchange and it got so bad that Milwaukee County transit buses diverted their routes. One bus was placed at the scene of the fire to help emergency responders and fire-fighters cool down. Milwaukee County sheriff's officials have urged drivers to use caution on Interstate 43 at Highway 145 because of the heavy smoke from the blaze.

Hockey

Pittsburgh Penguins star Evgeni Malkin and Nick Bjugstad will be out indefinitely with injuries. Coach Mike Sullivan said that Malkin's lower-body injury will require a longer recovery than Bjugstad's, but he added it is not season-threatening.

Both centers were injured during a 7-2 victory over Columbus on Thursday. Malki collided with teammate Kris Letang in the second period before limping down the runway. Bjugstad exited in the third with an undisclosed injury.

Stadelmann sentenced to nine years for fraud

MILWAUKEE - In giving convicted con man Jeffrey Stadelmann nine years in prison, Federal Judge Rudoph Randa went even beyond the sentence requested by prosecutors. Stadelmann was found guilty of stealing three million dollars from nearly 60 people. Some of them reportedly emptied their life savings and took out second mortgages to invest in the Menomonee Falls man's company. That money, federal prosecutors say, was actually being used by Stadelmann and his girlfriend to build a two million dollar home in Vilas County and run a resort in Boulder Junction. The Ponzi scheme played out over a six-year period starting in 2002.

Deputy charged with misconduct, pot possession

KENOSHA - A Kenosha county sheriff's deputy has been charged with misconduct in office and possessing marijuana.

A criminal complaint accuses Brian Houtsinger, 32, of filing a false report about the arrest of a man for bail jumping and of failing to file a report about marijuana he had confiscated during a vehicle stop. The complaint said Houtsinger later told authorities he threw the bag of marijuana in the trash at a nearby gas station.

Prosecutors said marijuana and drug paraphernalia were found in the deputy's squad car. The complaint said more than 13 grams of marijuana, packaging material and a digital scale were found in the truck. Houtsinger told investigators the marijuana had been there for months and that he had gotten it from a "young black kid."

Strip club visits cost school \$189,000

A former university professor in Philadelphia spent tens of thousands of dollars in federal money for local strip clubs and sports bars over a 10-year period, the Justice Department says.

Dr. Chikaodinaka D. Nwankpa misused \$189,062 of government grants from July 2008 through April 2018 while working at Drexel University, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office.

The university has agreed to pay back the money to resolve its potential civil liability in the case. Drexel said Tuesday in a statement to USA TODAY that it takes "allegations of unethical or unlawful business conduct ... very seriously."

The government's investigation began in 2018 after Drexel voluntarily disclosed fraudulent charges to eight federal grants that it received from the Navy, the Department of Energy and the National Science Foundation.

The grants were supposed to be spent on research related to energy and naval technology, but an internal audit revealed Nwankpa used the money for personal purchases and for "goods and services" provided by Cheerleaders, Club Risque, and Tacony Club.

Magnitude 5.9 shock rocks quake-stunned Puerto Rico

A magnitude 5.9 earthquake shook Puerto Rico on Friday, causing a landslide in the southern municipality of Peñuelas.

The quake at 8:54 a.m. local time struck eight miles southeast of Gianica at a shallow depth of three miles, according to the U.S. Geological Survey. It was the latest in a string of quakes and aftershocks that left thousands on the island without power and water.

Preliminary reports by the USGS said the quake was a magnitude 6.0 at a depth of six miles.

The quake caused power outages across the island, including areas of Lares, Adjuntas, Ponce, and San German, according to Puerto Rico's Electric Power Authority. The department was evaluating the damage.

Top judge elected as Greece's first female president

Greece has elected its first female president. High court judge and human rights advocate Katerina Sakellaropoulou was elected by parliament on Wednesday.

Nominated by New Democracy, the 63-year-old also secured backing from opposition party Syriza and Movement for Change.

To be successfully elected, Ms Sakellaropoulou required at least 200 votes, and ended up exceeding that with support from 261 MPs in the 300-seat Parliament – a result that Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis said offered "a window to the future".

When the PM first announced his nomination of Ms Sakellaropoulou, he had declared that change in Greek society "starts from the top ... with Greek women receiving the position they deserve".

After her election he echoed that sentiment, saying "Our country enters, with more optimism, into a new decade".

It's no secret that when it comes to gender equality in senior political positions in Europe, Greece is certainly behind.

But Ms. Sakellaropoulou's election has been seen as a big step forward. A poll by MRB this week revealed 55 per cent of respondents saw the high court judge as a positive choice.

Ms. Sakellaropoulou succeeds President Prokopis Pavlopoulos, and will serve a five-year term. She was also the first woman to serve as the president of the Council of State.

Kyrgyzstan approves cybersecurity strategy for 2020-2023

BISHKEK -- Kyrgyz Prime Minister Muhammedkaly Abylgaziyev approved the nation's Cybersecurity Strategy for 2020-2023 and a plan for its implementation on Friday.

The strategy covers the creation of computer incident response teams to ensure the cybersecurity of banking, telecom and other service infrastructure, as well as the creation of centers for monitoring and responding to cyber threats.

The document also calls for a legal and methodological foundation for combating computer crimes and for the creation of a national information security system.

Another goal is building international co-operation and strengthening human capacities in cybersecurity.

Weightlifting

Two more weightlifters face being stripped of their medals from the 2020 Olympics over doping.

The International Weightlifting Federation has said Romanians Roxana Cocos and Razvan Martin are suspected of using banned steroids after their 2012 samples were re-tested using modern technology. The IWF said Cocos' sample contained two different banned steroids and Martin's three.

Cocos is the silver medalist in the women's 69-kilogram category. If she is disqualified, Kazakh lifter Anna Nurmukhambetova would inherit second place, while Ubaldina Valoyes of Colombia would move up to the bronze spot.

Martin won bronze in the men's 69kg event, and his medal could pass to North Korean Kim Myong-Hok. Martin's already been banned once for doping from 2013 to 2015.

Gymnastics

European champion Nikita Nagornyy set the pace in the all-around standings as Russia topped the team event on the first day of the men's qualification at the Gymnastics World Championships in Stuttgart, Germany.

Nagornyy, part of the Russia squad which secured Olympic silver medals at the 2016 Games in Rio, scored a total of 87.333 points across six disciplines.

Compatior Dalaloyan Artur was second with 86.531 while Lee Chih-kai led a great team effort from Taiwan, which sits second in the overall rankings.

Soccer

Zlatan Ibrahimović and the LA Galaxy are officially parting ways after two seasons.

The 38-year-old Ibrahimović and the Galaxy both announced the decision Friday.

The Sweedish Superstar scored 56 goals in 52 MLS games after joining the Galaxy in March 2018.

But the Galaxy won just one playoff game in his tenure, and he lost the MLS MVP award this year to LAFC's Carlos Vela, who scored an MLS-record 34 goals to Zlatan's 30.

More than 1,000 feared dead after cyclone slams into Mozambique villages

JOHANNESBURG - More than 1,000 people were feared dead in Mozambique four days after a cyclone slammed into the country, submerging entire villages and leaving bodies floating in the floodwaters, the nation's president said.

"It is a real disaster of great proportions," President Filipe Nyusi said.

Cyclone Idai could prove to be the deadliest storm in generations to hit the impoverished southeast African country of 30 million people.

It struck Beira, an Indian Ocean port city of a half-million people, late Thursday and then moved inland to Zimbabwe and Malawi with strong winds and heavy rain. But it took days for the scope of the disaster to come into focus in Mozambique, which has a poor communication and transportation network and a corrupt and inefficient bureaucracy.

Speaking on state Radio Mozambique, Nyusi said that while the official death toll stood at 84, "It appears that we can register more than 1,000 deaths."

Emergency officials cautioned that while they expect the death toll to rise significantly, they have no way of knowing if it will reach the president's estimate.

Doctors Without Borders said rivers have broken their banks leaving many houses fully submerged and around 11,000 households displaced in Nsanje, in southern Malawi.

Space Junk harpooned like whale in orbit-cleanup test

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. – A harpoon flung from a satellite has successfully captured a piece of pretend space junk, like a whale.

The British-led experiment is part of an effort to clean up debris in orbit, hundreds of miles above Earth.

The University of Surrey's Guglielmo Aglietti said Friday that the steel-tipped harpoon scored a bull's-eye last Friday. The harpoon — no bigger than a writing pen — pierced an aluminum panel the size of a table tennis racket attached to the end of a satellite boom. The distance was just 5 feet, but researchers were delighted.

A video shows the harpoon slamming into the target and knocking it off its perch, and then the harpoon cable becoming entangled around the boom.

Aglietti said a much bigger harpoon will be needed in order to snare a real dead satellite — "Moby Dick style." Thousands of old satellite and rocket parts, and other junk circle Earth, a potential threat to working spacecraft, including the International Space Station.

The same team used a net to capture a piece of space junk, in a test last September. And in December, they tracked a tiny satellite ejected from the mother ship, using lasers.

All that remains is for the 250-mile-high satellite to re-enter the atmosphere and burn up. If all goes according to plan, a sail will inflate in March and eventually drag the satellite down, its mission accomplished.

Proud Boys member accused of role in Portland fights arrested

PORTLAND - Ore. – A right-wing extremist who rose to prominence for fighting in Portland during political protests and fled the Pacific Northwest after being indicted on felony assault charges was arrested Friday night. The U.S. Marshals Service detained Tusitala "Tiny" Toese, 23, at the Portland International Airport, said Brent Weisberg a spokesman for the Multnomah County District Attorney's Office. Toese, who is 6-foot-4 and 265 pounds gained notoriety as a member of the Patriot Prayer and Proud Boys groups.


3 Nobel winners will donate prize money to support research

CAMBRIDGE, Mass - The three winners of the Nobel Prize in Economics are donating their prize money to fund grants that will support economic research for the next 15 years.

Abhijit Banerjee and Esther Duflo, of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Michael Kremer, of Harvard University, will donate their prize money to the Weiss Fund for Research in Development Economics which is administered by Harvard University.


Banerjee, Duflo, and Kremer were honored by the Nobel Committee for their research on fighting global poverty.
